Scope and Standards of Practice for APN and RN Nurses

Hospice and palliative care is a relatively new nursing specialty. In the United States, hospice was founded in the mid-1970s. Nearly 15 years later, acute care facilities began to question the quality of end-of-life care in hospitals. Through a grant provided by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the SUPPORT study was launched.

In addition to improving palliative care delivery in nursing homes, increasing access to hospice services will also help to align care with residents' preferences at the end of life.
